Abigail's Party is morbidly compelling. Set in suburbia, it is a study of three problematic relationships. Below the scathing satire there is a near-tragic exposé of the struggles of ordinary, incompatible people against the era's tide of social mobility and class-consciousness.

Abigail's Party has been described as a 'savage satire on England's middle-class'. This bitter-sweet, darkly comic play celebrates its 30th anniversary in 2007. It was originally devised as a play for the Hampstead Theatre and then subsequently broadcast as a Play for Today for the BBC. Probably Mike Leigh's best-known television work, it is also one of the most celebrated TV plays of the 1970s.


NEW WRITING

Network Theatre is a private members club, licensed for regulated entertainment and the sale of alcohol to members and their guests.

It's the home of the Network Theatre Company, located under the arches of Waterloo Station, London.

This amateur company was originally founded as the Southern Railway Dramatic Society in 1939 and has been going strong ever since. Our theatre is leased from Spacia, part of Network Rail, and we thank them for their continuing support.

What goes on there?

We produce a wide range of theatre from classic plays to new writing, from comedy to cry-your-eyes-out, mixed media and musicals. The list is endless. Recent Network Theatre Company productions have also been seen at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, The Rosemary Branch in Islington and the Prague Fringe Festival.

We also organise regular social events, workshops and play readings, so it's a great way of meeting new friends and keeping in touch with old ones.

How can I get involved?

We don't just want performers – we also welcome directors, backstage team (e.g. costume, props, lighting, sound, stage crew) and people willing to help out front of house with the box office and bar.

We're a friendly and relaxed group; we don't believe in holding nerve-wracking auditions in order for you to join. All you need to do is send us an email at info@networktheatre.org with your contact details and we'll send you a form – or pick up one at the theatre.

We survive by subscriptions and box office takings, so if you would like to become a member you will need to pay a small membership fee.



