Chairman's Message

Without writers, actors would have a dull time.

Some years ago Network Theatre committed itself to supporting new work and in 2011 our efforts were recognised when we won a Writers' Guild Theatre Encouragement Award.

Not every one with an idea for a stage play has the confidence or experience to compose a full length piece but all ideas with help and encouragement can make the journey from thought to page. From the page to the stage is another journey again. Love and Deceit was born of a wish to help members realise an idea, a thought that came to them sitting on a bus, in the shower, in the middle of the night or the middle of the road.

It was decided to set the theme and the invitation to submit scripts was sent out. Some of the submissions came from writers whose work has already been staged, for others it was their first script. What you now see on the stage follows two evenings of readings where the writers heard their words come off the page and perhaps more usefully, what others thought of their stories and characters. There followed a rehearsal period during which the script altered again as the director, the writer and the actors discovered things that one or other had not seen or envisaged.

Love and Deceit being a collection of short plays has allowed some who have never directed the chance to see just what it is like to take a script from a writer, thrust it into the hands of actors and create something.

Tonight you see the first steps not only of writers but of directors. Follow those steps - who knows where they will lead.



Over 70 years ago Southern Railways founded a theatre group at Waterloo.

The spirit of amateur theatre has survived through changes of name and nationalisation but is finding it tough to cope with the costs that followed the privatisation of the railways.

Please help us to continue to entertain you by becoming a member of the Arch 200 Club.
