Stanley was created. He has 2.4 children, drives a Fiat and lives in suburbia. But he's frustrated! His frustration comes out through a song – a ditty about a house-husband wanting to reclaim his masculinity.

Oops, the small person with the big imagination hasn't stuck to the pantomime formula. She's only gone and written a song without having a musician on board. But she's on a roll. Lyrics and melodies come fast and furious, and before you know it she's got a script with eight new songs.

The script is presented to the theatre gang over dinner at Nigel W's.

"Hmm," everybody says. "Great songs, but you say you can't score music and play the piano. We're a bit worried!"

Help!

Someone else who had left the same life of corporate nonsense heard her calls for help. He's a musician. She sings the ditties into his dictaphone. They join forces. He gets cracking on the piano music. She churns out more songs. He beavers away arranging them, rejigging choruses and gluing together a medley for the finale. Between them they end up with 13 new songs, allowing them to take out a couple of karaoke fillers. They're now itching to add three more to make it an entirely original score.




The Head: Mike Wyer
