The Cherry Orchard

'But the whole tragedy of futility is that it never succeeds in achieving tragedy. In its blackest moments it is inevitably doomed to the comic gesture.' - Dorothy Sayers, in defence of The Cherry Orchard as a comedy.

In *The Cherry Orchard*, Chekhov introduces us to a selection of characters that are desperate for something to happen, but completely ineffectual in taking action. It's a play where nobody seems to know how to get what they want. As the play progresses, we see characters jump from one subject to the next, without really addressing the central problem of the play - What is to be done about the cherry orchard? What ensues is a series of farce-like scenes brought on by, as mentioned by Dorothy Sayers, the futility of the characters.

The characters are not only incapable of doing something about the cherry orchard; they find it impossible to get what they want from one another. In *The Cherry Orchard*, each character is isolated from those around them and unable to make human connections. The comedic elements of the play also isolate the audience from the psychological reality of the problems these characters face, resulting in a kind of fishbowl effect. In observing these characters, we can relate to and see our own struggle with indecisiveness and isolation.

As we press our faces up to the glass of this Chekhovian aquarium, we can observe, in Sayers words, these characters in their 'blackest moments, inevitably doomed to the comic gesture' and ask ourselves, would we do any different?

Thank you to all who participated in this production. This has been a phenomenal experience and I am grateful for such a talented and committed cast and crew. Thanks also to all the committee members who went above and beyond their duties to ensure I had what I needed to create a successful production. Thank you for coming and enjoy the show.

Over 70 years ago, Southern Railways founded a theatre group at Waterloo.

The spirit of amateur theatre has survived through changes of name and nationalisation and is now struggling with the costs that came with privatisation. Please help us to continue to entertain you by becoming a member of the Arch 200 Club.

Marlowe's classic morality play, of a hero gone bad, is reinterpreted and directed by Bernie C. Byrnes. Did our hero choose his own way or was his destiny predetermined? If we are all truly damned, what point is there in being good?

In London in the 70's against a backdrop of IRA bombings, eminent physician Dr Faustus despairs at the lottery of death and destruction. He damns the law, science and God and seeks power and riches through black magic. Faustus dices with the devil and strikes a bargain for ultimate power in exchange for his soul.

Four and twenty years of absolute power and corruption later, as we reach the new millennium, the devil collects from Faustus. But man still struggles with his place in the universe, religious troubles continue to dominate the news, and random bombings lend an air of chance to any journey.
